


BNF Summit Continuing Education – To the Ends of the Earth: Leading a Medical Mission Team During a Global Pandemic





PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Our goals included: continuing our educational offerings and finding a reliable source for NAPD's; increasing our revenue stream by developing a Patron program; promoting and expanding our mission opportunities locally, nationally and aboard; increasing our Prayer presence on line and maintaining our prayer connects; introducing new ways to fellowship virtually, such as our New Page Tuners book club Book Club; strengthening our online presence thru webpage redesign; and increasing our membership base thru membership support and student mentoring.

National BNF has been represented by ET members and members at large at the IMB Med Advance conference in VA, at various smaller IMB gatherings around the nation, at numerous State WMU leadership meetings, and at the National WMU meetings. California WMU even set up a booth to share about BNF. Most of these meetings were in person, which is a celebration and praise.

Let us continue to rise the occasion to represent BNF wherever we can. New promotional materials are in the works, and we continue to develop our Web presence, all which helps to recruit and retain membership. Your input and feedback are important so please let the ET hear from you.

The Summit is pinnacle of the BNF's year. Let's share with other fellow nurses and other health-care professionals the Who and Why of BNF.

PRESIDENT ELECT/MEMBERSHIP CHAIR REPORT TO NATIONAL BNF SEPTEMBER 1, 2022

It has been my joy to work alongside the Lead Team and the EC to plan and implement the goals of BNF for this year. Getting to know the individual members at a higher level, witnessing their love for the Lord, and their desire to make Him known, has helped me grow in the Lord.

I have focused on increasing our membership and getting membership as accurate as possible. It is important that as people join, they are recognized as soon as possible and begin receiving information about BNF and how they can be an informed and participating member.

We began the year with an adjusted membership of 125. The total membership on August 31, 2022, is 236. There are presently 26 missionary nurse members (either active or emerita). My goal is to increase that number in the coming year as more missionaries are made aware of BNF. All missionary members are eligible to receive a scholarship from the Ellen Tabor Fund to assist with expenses to attend the Summit. All new and renewing members receive a welcome letter with their membership card. During the year all those members who had not renewed their membership received a note of encouragement. There has also been follow-up of past members (prior to 2021). I have made numerous phone calls to talk to new members and learn more about them and their heart for the Lord.

I have also worked on revision of the by-laws and policies and procedures during this year, but any revision will be completed for voting in 2023 Summit once the EC has an opportunity to evaluate and vote on any changes.

Benita Decker and I had the opportunity to represent BNF at the Illinois Priority Conference in April. We presented a session on "healthy aging" and had a display. Over 26 nurses and other health care professionals received information about BNF. A follow-up email was sent to the 26 who signed up.

I was very disappointed that we were unable to follow-through on the BNF sponsored trip to the Ukraine due to the war. We continue to pray for the Christians in that country and are open to participating in a trip when it becomes possible.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The main responsibility as Education Committee chairperson is to coordinate continuing education content for the national BNF Summit. There is a great deal of collaboration among the other Executive Committee (EC) members in the recommendation of speakers as well as ideas related to speaker content. We rely on the valuable feedback from past meetings and speaker evaluations in the selection of topics and speakers.

The education committee has had an extremely busy and promising year as you can see by the highlights listed below. During the year 2021/2022 we should conclude the year with a total of 8 continuing educational opportunities. While we did incur some problems with getting Nursing Continuing Professional Development (NCPD, changed from CEU) certificates and approvals, we were able to switch providers so that certificates and program approvals would be received in a more timely manner.

BNFV is thankful to WMUV for initiating this grant application and working diligently to final approval. Karen Stokes, BNFV member, is serving as the coordinating nurse of this project and 2 other clinics will take place in September and October.
- BNFV members assembled and distributed over 125 gift bags to nursing students at Old Dominion University, Norfolk, and Centra College, Lynchburg
- BNFV participated as Camp Nurses for CrossRoads Camp during June & July 2022.

Karen Stokes is a member of the national BNF missions and prayer committee, Karen was recently sponsored by national BNF to take the instructor course of Mental Health First Aid. Karen will teach a preconference at our BNF national meeting, The Summit, in October.

The Faith Community Nurses (FCN) training conference and retreat was held May 20-22, 2022, at CrossRoads Camp and Conference Center. BNFV and WMUV partnered with Shenandoah University for this robust and needed education for nurses. WMUV President, Lucianne Warren, will led the group is a time of reflection in the final session on Sunday, May 22. 8 nurses completed the course with a final ceremony that was held at Calvary Baptist Church, Lynchburg, VA. 5 nurses live in Virginia, one nurse lives in South Carolina and one lives in California.

The Communication Committee's strategic goal is to provide **bnf** information through a variety of communication processes to inform, encourage, educate, and empower **bnf** members. This goal was met through a variety of activities this year.

- A new bnf website was established this year. This website provides
 members more information about bnf activities and events both on a
 national and local level. The new server provides website administrators more options for engaging members and is easier to navigate and
 to update.
- The use of Constant Contact® has given Executive Committee leadership the ability to provide attractive and engaging emails that can be read effectively on any electronic device, including computer, tablet, and phone.
- The monthly prayergrams continue to provide members with spiritual encouragement and prayer prompts that help them strengthen their spiritual journey and the work of the organization.
- The bi-monthly Lamplighter newsletter continues to provide members with information about health topics, bnf activities and information about missionary nurses and bnf -related issues.
- bnf increased our presence on social media this year by increasing the number of posts on Facebook which, in turn, increased the number of responses and engagement by members.
- bnf, through many of the Executive Committee members and other
